

School Performance Data for St Brigid's School, Collie for the 2015 School Year

1. Background: St Brigid's School Collie is a co-educational Catholic Primary school from 3 Year Olds to Year 6 and our primary purpose is to provide children from the town of Collie and its surrounds with a Catholic Education in a safe, caring and loving environment. Our school is centred on Christian Values whereby all members of our school community treat each other with the respect and dignity each deserves. "Together in Christ" is the school motto. The school is characterised by its strong sense of community between the school, parish and parents. Parents actively support the school and the staff work collaboratively as a team in its endeavours to provide our children with the opportunity to reach their full potential. The school took over the old St. Edmund's College campus in 2003 and was completely refurbished before the move. Specialist subject areas include, Art, Drama, Library, ICT, Italian and Physical Education. All classes are equipped with Interactive White Boards as well as four computers. A lab of 30 are available for use with the children. We also have 50 ipads used across the school. St Brigid's bases its literacy and numeracy programs on RAISe principles and offers an extension program in Years 4-6. A Chaplain is also employed to work closely with the children and parents in implementing our pastoral care program, thanks to the Federal Government's Chaplaincy Program.

Addressing School Improvement Priorities

In 2015, St Brigid's was recognised as being one in the Top 25 Catholic Schools for Improved NAPLAN results for the previous three years. We have had a string focus on the early years with intensive intervention programmes offered in Kindergarten to Year 1. St Brigid's School has been part of the National Partnership Program since 2010 which has provided opportunities for teachers. The NPP Reward Funding received in 2013 was used to purchase Fountas & Pinnell Levelled Literacy Intervention Blue System which was used to implement an intensive support programme for Year 2 and 3 students. A Reading Comprehension Series was purchased for Year 5 students. With the extra funding we were also able to offer more Teacher Assistant time to support the extra programmes. Significant improvement was achieved as a result of these programmes and support.

Our main investigation in 2014 was to focus on the essential skills needed in the area of English to improve Grammar and Punctuation outcomes in our students as a priority for 2015. With this also, we have worked to consolidate our previous focus on Spelling. We will also continue to focus on Persuasive texts and introduce a greater focus on Narrative texts, to ensure our students develop skills in these writing genres.
